Pixelating Screenshots on Windows

Using Paint to Pixelate

Microsoft Paint, a classic application available on all Windows versions, can be surprisingly effective for pixelating portions of an image.

9. If the pixelated area is not as strong as you'd like, you can repeat steps 3-6 on the already pixelated selection until you achieve the desired effect.
10. Use the "Fill with color" tool to cover the original sensitive area with a solid block of color, ensuring it is completely hidden. Choose a neutral color like black or gray.
11. Save your edited screenshot.

Utilizing Snipping Tool/Snip & Sketch Features

The Snipping Tool (older Windows versions) and its successor, Snip & Sketch (Windows 10 and 11), offer basic annotation features that can be used for blurring, though not directly pixelation.

With Snip & Sketch, you can capture your screen and then use the pen tools. While there isn't a dedicated pixelate tool, you can simulate it by drawing over the sensitive area with a thick, opaque marker in a solid color. This effectively hides the content, similar to pixelation for privacy purposes.

For more direct pixelation, you would typically need to combine these tools with a photo editor like Paint as described above.

Pixelating Screenshots on macOS

macOS provides excellent built-in tools for capturing and editing screenshots, including features that can be used to pixelate parts of your images.

Using Preview to Redact
